Comments: Two of my top priorities are improving public education and increasing economic opportunities in Arizona. Creating a robust arts community is an important part of meeting these goals. First, as a mother of two boys, I believe that every Arizona child is entitled to an equitable public education. Sadly, the state legislature has cut education funding while providing tax loopholes to special interest groups. I would work to close those loopholes, fund education to the national average per student, provide increased funding for teachers/staff, and support arts education. Second, I will work to provide increased economic opportunities in the Northwest Valley, an area that was hard-hit by the great recession. Ninety-percent of the residents of Peoria and Surprise drive out of the community to work each day and my goal would be to create more jobs for them in their own communities. To that end, I will promote expansion of public transportation, promote increased technology jobs, and support a vibrant arts community in the Northwest Valley

Comments: One of my campaign volunteers shared this story. She is a Music Therapist, and worked with people who have Alzheimer's disease in a nursing home. After weeks of Music Therapy, one woman did not respond. She was nearly deaf, had dementia, and she did not speak or interact with anyone in the group. But one day, the woman turned the Music Therapist and said, "Are we in G Major?" The group was in G major! Everyone was shocked, including the Music Therapist and the nursing home staff. The arts have an intangible power—they are part of what makes us human. I believe the arts should be experienced by people of all ages and ability levels. If elected, I will support community health programs that benefit underserved populations, such as Guitars 4 Vets and Essential Theatre.

A few months ago, a friend of mine had the opportunity to play with the Symphony of the West Valley in a concert. The group performed Tchaikovsky's Fifth Symphony and Rimsky Korsakov's Capriccio Italian. The Valley Vista Performing Arts Center was sold-out, and the audience gave a standing ovation after the concert. The crowd was so large that local police even had to direct traffic! The quality of the performance was amazing, and it was wonderful to see how the orchestra has grown in the past decade.

But, even more than the orchestra's performance, I was impressed to see the audience response! Clearly, the West Valley appreciates the arts. And I support the work of organizations like the West Valley Arts Council and the Symphony of the West Valley. These groups and others help the arts to become more visible in West Phoenix.

Music has been part of my life since I was a child. As a student of the Pendergast District in West Phoenix, I was thrilled to start learning the clarinet. I practiced for hours--playing countless excerpts, scales and Klose etudes. I played in local ensembles, such as the Phoenix Youth Symphony, in the All State ensembles, and even soled with the Phoenix Symphony at age 16. I taught clarinet and saxophone to local students, and started my university career as music major.

After I graduated ASU with a degree in French Language and Literature, I moved to New York City, where I worked for the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts Educational Arm (the Institute). I worked to bring arts education to the curriculum in public schools in the five boroughs. I remember a group of kindergarten students sitting in front of a Chuck Close painting at the Metropolitan Museum of Art discussing it like college students. These kids were not from backgrounds of wealth or privilege; in fact many had never seen a painting in real-life. The Lincoln Center curriculum allowed educators to teach concepts as varied as mathematics, literacy, history, political science, etc., using arts as a vehicle through their line of inquiry model. In fact, educators from around the country come to New York to attend a week-long seminar each summer to bring the Lincoln Center Institute's philosophy of arts education back to their communities in other states.

When I returned to Arizona and started a family, I knew that the arts were still an important part of my life. Today, my sons Luke and Leo are both learning piano, and I hope to continue the family tradition!
